## Gratitude to God for Little and Much

—"I believe, that God will help me," – some say, but then they try to save money so that they would not suffer any want. Such people mock God, because they are entrusting themselves not to Him, but to money. If they do not stop loving money, and put all their hope in it, then they cannot put their trust in God. I am not saying that people should not have some kind of savings in case of need, no. But they should not put their trust in money, they should not give their heart to money, because in doing so, people forget God. A person who, not trusting God, makes his own plans, and then says that God wants this, demonically "blesses" his deed and constantly suffers. We have not realized how powerful and kind God is. We do not let Him be the master, do not let Him direct us, and therefore we suffer.

On Sinai, in the cell of St. Epistimia where I lived, there was just a bit of water. In one cave, about 20 meters from the cell, water seeped drop by drop from a crack in the cliff. I made a small water collector and collected 3 liters of water a day. When I came for water, I put a tin can under the drip, and while it was filling, read the akathist to the Most Holy Theotokos. I wet my head a little, only my forehead, this helped me, one doctor had suggested this, I collected a little water to drink, in a separate can I collected a little water for the mice and birds living near my cell. For laundry and other needs, I used this very water from the cave. What joy, what thanks I felt for this little amount of water that I had! I praised God that I had water.

Then, when I came to the Holy Mountain and lived in the Iberian Skete for a short time, there, inasmuch as that side was sunny, there was no shortage of water. There was a cistern, out of which the water poured over the sides. Ooh! I washed my head, and feet... but the past was forgotten. On Sinai my eyes teared from thanks for the little amount I had, but here, in the skete, I fell into forgetfulness from the abundance of water. Therefore, I left this cell and set up residence father away, about 80 meters distant, where

there was a small cistern. How lost a person becomes, forgetful, from abundance!

We must completely, unconditionally entrust ourselves to Divine Providence, to God's will, and God will take care of us. A monk once went to the top of a mountain in order to serve vespers there. He found a white mushroom along the way and thanked God for this rare find. On the way back, he wanted to cut off this mushroom and prepare it for dinner. "If secular people will begin to ask me, if I eat meat, — the monk reasoned in his thoughts, — then I can say, that I eat it every autumn!" On the way back to the kaliva, the monk saw that, while he was reading vespers, an animal had stepped on the mushroom, and only half remained intact. "Apparently, — said the monk, — this is how much I should eat." He took what remained, and thanked God for His Providence, for the half of the mushroom. A little farther on he found another mushroom half, bent down to pick it and supplement the deficiency in his dinner, but saw that the mushroom was rotten (possibly, it was poisonous). The monk left it and thanked God again for protecting him from being poisoned. Returning to the kaliva, the monk supped with the half of the mushroom. The following day, when he left his home, a marvelous sight revealed itself. Beautiful mushrooms had grown all around the kaliva, and seeing them, the monk once again thanked God. See, he thanked God for both the whole mushroom and for the half, for the good and the bad, for one and for many. He was thankful for all.

Kind God gives us generous blessings, and His actions are directed towards our benefit. All the good that we have – are God's gifts. He placed everything in service to His creation – man, He made it so that everything: animals, and birds, and small, and large, even plants – sacrifice themselves for him. And God Himself sacrificed Himself in order to deliver man. Let us not be indifferent to all this, let us not wound Him with our great ungratefulness and insensibility, but let us begin to thank and praise Him.

**Fifteenth Anniversary of the Glorification of St. John of Shanghai and San Francisco:** This year marks the fifteenth anniversary of the glorification of St. John. This year the feast will be marked on Saturday, July 4 (closest Saturday to 19 June/2 July). The Cathedral in San Francisco where St. John is interred will mark the feast with services beginning at 7:30 pm on 2 July (Akathist to St. John), including an All-Night Vigil beginning at 6:00 pm, and Divine Liturgy beginning at 9:00 am, after which a Molieben of Intercession will take place. Festivities will conclude with a festal Trapeza. If you should find yourself in the area on any of these dates, we hope you will stop in and venerate the relics of St. John, who is such a protector of the Diaspora.

**St. Seraphim Russian Orthodox Youth Camp:** St. Seraphim Youth Camp is a private, non-profit, fully insured organization serving the needs of the Russian Orthodox community. The camp was founded in 1994 with the blessing of His Eminence, Metropolitan Laurus of the Russian Orthodox Church Abroad. It uses the facilities of the Boy Scouts of America in the beautiful Pocono Mountains of Pennsylvania.

The camp is held each year at the feast of St. Seraphim of Sarov. Children between grades 3 and 12 who are members of the Russian Orthodox Church are accepted. This year's camp will take place between July 26 and August 2. Each day begins and ends with prayer and includes daily religious instruction. The fasts of the Russian Orthodox Church are strictly observed. A camp choir sings the services, and each child goes to Confession and Holy Communion.

Camp activities include all the wonderful experiences we associate with camping, including arts and crafts, swimming, sports, archery, hiking, tube rafting, flag games and, of course, bonfires.

We found ourselves very much in tune this year with Metropolitan HILARION's decree that the Feast of All Saints is to be dedicated to youth.

## **Holy Passion-Bearers Boris and Gleb First Glorified Russian Saints**

July 24 / August 6

The holy Passion-bearers Boris and Gleb were the first Russian saints glorified by the Russian and Byzantine Churches. They were the sons of the great Prince Vladimir, the baptizer of the Russian people. They became known as Passion-bearers, since they did not resist evil with violence. They received the crown of martyrdom in 1015.

Boris (in baptism Romanus) and Gleb (in baptism David) were brothers by the same mother. Their father Vladimir, before his baptism, had numerous wives and many children by them. Hence, Vladimir divided up the state among all of his sons before his death, and after his death the eldest son, Sviatopolk, became Prince of Kiev (the main city of the state, Kievan Rus'). Sviatopolk (known to history as "the Accursed" and who scorned the laws of the newly adopted Christian religion) was jealous and wanted yet more power, and he planned to kill his brothers in order to gain their territories.

Some of Vladimir's advisers told Boris that he should take the army and establish himself as ruler of Kiev. St Boris, however, said that he could never lift his hand against his own brother.

Sviatopolk sent assassins to the Alta to kill Boris, who already knew that his brother wanted him dead. When they arrived they heard him chanting psalms and praying before an icon of Christ. He asked the Lord to strengthen him for the suffering he was about to endure. He also prayed for Sviatopolk, asking God not to count this against him as sin. Then he lay down upon his couch, and the assassins stabbed him with their lances.

After Sviatopolk had killed Boris, he sent Gleb a message saying that their father was ill and wished to see him. As he was on his way, he received word that their father had died and that Sviatopolk had murdered Boris.

St Gleb wept for his father and brother, and was lamenting them when the assassins arrived. They seized his boat and drew their weapons, but it was Gleb's cook who stabbed him with a knife. The martyr's body was thrown onto the shore between two trees. Later, he was buried beside St Boris in the church of St Basil. He is also commemorated on September 5.

## **Translation of the Image of Our Lord**

August 16 / 29

According to Tradition, during the time of the earthly ministry of the Savior, Abgar V ruled in the Syrian city of Edessa. He was afflicted with leprosy over his whole body. At this time report of the great miracles performed by the Lord extended throughout Syria (Matt. 4:24) and as far as Arabia. Although not having seen the Lord, Abgar believed in Him as the Son of God and wrote a letter requesting Him to come and heal him. With this letter he sent to Palestine his court-painter Ananias, entrusting him to paint an image of the Divine Teacher.

Ananias went to Jerusalem and saw the Lord surrounded by people. He was not able to go to Him because of the great throng of people listening to His preaching; so he stood on a huge rock and attempted to produce a painting of the image of the Lord Jesus Christ, unable, however, to succeed. The Savior Himself called him by name and gave for Abgar a beautiful letter in which, having glorified the faith of the ruler, He promised to send His disciple in order to heal him from the leprosy and instruct him in salvation.

After this, the Lord called for water and a towel. He wiped His face, rubbing with the towel, and on it was impressed His Divine Image. The towel and the letter the Savior sent with Ananias to Edessa. With thanksgiving Abgar received the sacred object and received healing, but a small portion, only a trace, remained of the terrible disease on his face until the arrival of the promised Disciple of the Lord.

The Apostle of the 70, Thaddeus, came to him and preached the Gospel, baptizing the believing Abgar and all living in Edessa. Having written on the Image Not-Made-By-Hands the words, 'Christ-God, everyone trusting in Thee will not be put to shame', Abgar adorned it and placed it in a niche over the city gates.

Concerning the subsequent fate of the Image Not-Made-By-Hands, there exist several traditions. According to one, it was carried away by Crusaders during the time of their dominion over Constantinople (1204-61), but the ship on which the Holy Objects had been taken, sank in the Sea of Marmora. According to another, the Image Not-Made-By-Hands was taken about 1362 to Genoa, where it was presented to and preserved in a monastery dedicated to the Apostle Bartholomew.

The story is recorded in the Ecclesiastical History of Eusebius of Caesarea.
